Casa Mila' - La Pedrera

Casa Milà, also known as *La Pedrera*, is a famous building in Barcelona designed by the renowned architect Antoni Gaudí. Completed in 1912, it is celebrated for its unique, organic design, with undulating stone facades, wrought-iron balconies, and sculptural chimneys. The building was originally intended as a residential apartment complex, but its unconventional architecture made it stand out as a masterpiece of Modernisme (Catalan Art Nouveau). Casa Milà is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and a major attraction for visitors to Barcelona.

Casa Batllo'

Palau de la Musica Catalana
